Snow Day Packet K-2 User Guide - How to Use This Packet

This packet is designed for easy, independent practice at home or school. Students strengthen foundational literacy, math, and executive-function skills using simple materials—just crayons, a pencil, and a quiet workspace.

Universal Skills Overview

This page outlines core skills students will practice: phonics, early writing, number sense, direction-following, and work habits. These align broadly with K-2 standards across states and homeschool programs.

Math: Snowflake Number combinations

Students explore number pairs using snowflakes.

- Encourage counting aloud.
- Ask guiding questions like, "What two numbers make ___?"
- Allow them to draw extra snowflakes if helpful.

Phonics: Beginning Sounds and Letter Matching

Students circle pictures with the same beginning sound.

- · Say each picture aloud slowly.
- Emphasize the starting sound: '/p/...p-enguin'.
- Let students self-check by repeating the words.

Opposite Mittens Coloring Page

Students choose two colors. They color mitten #1 freely, then reverse the colors on mitten #2 while keeping the pattern the same.

Builds: pattern recognition, multi-step direction following, fine motor skills.

Color-By-Number: Geo-Cat

Students color sections using the number key.

Supports number recognition, visual discrimination, and focus on details.

Reading Comprehension: "Mia's Snow Day"

Students read a short passage and use color-coded crayons:

- Blue = Beginning
- Red = Ending
- Green = Problem
- Brown = Solution

Ask questions like: "What happened first?" "What solved the problem?"

Story Sequencing (Draw & Write)

Students draw four small pictures and label each part using the same color-coding. This strengthens retelling, organization of events, and early writing.

Tips for Success

- Break activities into small chunks.
- Encourage neat coloring and careful rereading.
- Allow invented spelling.
- Celebrate effort and independence.
